

From our Director of Parish Life

"You know that while all the runners in the stadium take part in the race, only one receives the prize. In that case, run so as to win! Athletes deny themselves all sorts of things. They do this to win a crown of leaves that withers, but we a crown that is imperishable. I do not run like one who loses sight of the finish line. I do not fight as if I were shadowboxing. What I do is discipline my own body and master it, for fear that having preached to others I myself should be disqualified." — 1 Corinthians 9:24-27

As we continue the Jubilee Year of Hope, this weekend we celebrate the Jubilee of Sports. Sports have always enjoyed the esteem of the Church. As Pope Francis addressed the International Conference on Sports and Spirituality last year, "The Apostle Paul more than once compared the spiritual life to an athletic competition . . . whose prize is Christ himself. The discipline and self-control of athletes, as well as their spirit of healthy competition, have often served as images of Christian life and virtue." Sports teach the virtues of discipline and endurance, teamwork and cooperation, and stewardship and care for our bodies. Catholic parishes and schools have long served their communities by offering opportunities to participate in sports, especially for youth and the poor. Sports also offer a way toward inclusion and solidarity. Special Olympics was founded by a Catholic, Eunice Kennedy Shriver—President Kennedy's sister—and her son Timothy Shriver is currently the organization's Chairperson. Hé states that Special Olympics uses sports to "educate the public about people with intellectual disabilities, change perceptions, challenge stereotypes, and address barriers to inclusion." Many saints have used sports as a way to build strong, healthy relationships with God, nature, and neighbor, such as St. John Bosco, St. Teresa of the Andes, St. Luigi Scrosoppi, St. John Paul II, Blessed Chiara Badano, and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati.

However, something does seem to be askew about our current sports culture. Sports have become "big business" in our nation, leading to a "win at all costs" mentality that actually harms athletes physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Athletes, even young athletes, are injured, used up, and discarded when no longer profitable to the organization. I'm a big fan of sports and of Michigan's teams (especially the Detroit Lions), but sports fandom has increasingly gone off

the rails. It has become increasingly common online to see over-the-top abusive language or violence by sports fans. If I find that I'm in such a bad mood when my team loses that it negatively impacts my relationships in my marriage, with my children, and amongst my friends and co-workers, it is a reality check that, as St. Augustine warned, my loves have become wrongly ordered.

We can see another challenge to what St. Augustine referred to as welldirected love— "loving things in the right order"—in youth sports culture. Earlier this year, Fr. Joshua Whitfield wrote an article in America magazine entitled, "Soccer vs. Sunday Mass: How youth sports are undermining religion and hurting our kids." Fr. Whitfield writes from a unique perspective as pastoral administrator of a large Catholic parish in Dallas (the heart of Cowboy country!) and as a husband and father of five children (he's a former Episcopal priest). I would encourage everyone, especially parents, to read his article online. In the article, he questions if our current youth sports culture is truly beneficial to our young people. He quotes the writers of the book Overplayed, who have "become increasingly concerned about the toll that current youth sports culture is taking on children, young people, and families. Families' dollars and time are stretched and stressed. Children are suffering overuse injuries and burning out at younger and younger ages. They're being asked to perform appropriate beyond developmental stages. They're failing to develop some of the intrinsic values that adults assume sports will teach them. Parents are damaging their relationships with their kids and with each other. And far too often, as we struggle to navigate this new terrain, we're driven not by love but by fear." This diagnosis aligns with some of the things that I have witnessed both as a father and throughout my career as a lay minister.

Sports are a wonderful part of human life, but it makes a very poor religion. When I was serving in North Muskegon around the year 2000, I was told that my faith formation classes had to be on Wednesday because "Wednesday night is church night in North Muskegon. Games are not scheduled, and coaches don't have practice. There are no dance classes or recitals." I don't know if that is still true there, but I would doubt it. In our era of travel leagues, multiple teams, individualized coaching, etc., no time is viewed as more sacred than sports, even Sunday mornings! A couple years ago, the bishop in Grand Rapids ordered all parish gymnasiums closed (no games, no practices) on Sundays throughout the diocese when the priests were reporting seeing more of their parishioners at the Sunday afternoon basketball or volleyball game than at Saturday evening or Sunday morning Mass. For St. Agustine, **God is the** summum bonum, the highest good, and love for God and communion with God is what the rest of our loves and passions should be scheduled around. When our participation in or passionate fandom for sports takes the place of our participation in the weekly Eucharist and our passion for Holy Communion with God and neighbor in love, we have lost sight of our true "finish line" and our priorities need to be recalibrated.

May this Jubilee of Sports be an opportunity for all of us to give thanks for the gift of sports and the virtues they inculcate, put our passion for sports in the right perspective, and always put our first priority on worship and communion with the one God who is Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



Thoughtful Moments

St. Aloysius Gonzaga

St. Aloysius wanted to be a priest but had to wait for his father's approval. As the eldest son of a Marquis, St. Aloysius was expected to inherit the position. After three years, he was permitted to join the Jesuit Order in 1585. His studies for the priesthood were interrupted by a devasting plague. He helped tend the victims and shortly died after catching the disease. He is remembered for his purity, holiness, penances, and scholarly brilliance.

Jesus reveals the Father's love

Through the Gospels, Jesus teaches us about God's incredible love. By His example, He encourages us to respond as sons and daughters to a Father who loves us selflessly, extravagantly, compassionately, infinitely.

"I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep"



Pope Leo urges parents to raise faithful Catholics in a troubled world

In his first papal homily, Pope Leo XIV delivered a heartfelt message to Catholic families: stay rooted in Christ—and pass that faith on to your children.

Jesus as model.

"[Jesus] showed us a model of human holiness," the Pope said, reminding us that God made Himself known in every stage of life: as a trusting child, a curious teenager, and a devout adult.

Jesus is the perfect example of

obedience, humility, and service—qualities we can nurture in our children.

Parents have a mission. The pope said, "We are called to bear witness to our joyful faith in Jesus the Savior."

When faith fades, he warned, society loses its moral compass—mercy is ignored, families fall apart, and life feels empty. Passing on the Catholic Faith isn't just for our children's sake—it's how we plant seeds of love and hope that will bear fruit. Lead by example. The Pope closed with a challenge, "It is essential that we too repeat with Peter, 'You are the Christ...'" (Matthew 16:16). The Holy Father said Peter's response is meant to be ours, too. "It is essential to do

this ... in our personal relationship with the Lord, in our commitment to a daily journey of conversion." If you live as if Jesus is Lord of your whole life, your children will, too.

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics call the Pope "Peter's Successor"?

Catholics call the pope Peter's successor because we believe Jesus appointed St. Peter as the first leader of the Church, saying, "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church" (Matthew 16:18). Peter became the first



bishop of Rome, and his authority has been passed down through an unbroken line of popes. Each pope inherits Peter's role as the visible head of the Church on earth, guiding the faithful in unity, truth, and pastoral care.

"What is God like?"

Explaining an infinite God to children can be challenging, but Jesus teaches us to think of God as our own Father. "No one is father as God is Father" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #239). Here are three truths to share:

"Merciful and gracious." God isn't cold or distant. He is moved by our suffering (Exodus 3:7-8). He gives good gifts (Matthew 7:11), and even gave us His Son (Romans 8:32). If He withholds something we want, it's to offer something even better.

"Slow to anger." God's love doesn't fade. He never

tires of forgiving us if we are repentant. His patience invites us to be more patient—with our children, our families, and ourselves.

"Abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." The Bible is one long story of God keeping His promises. In the Old Testament, He vows redemption and restoration. In the New, He fulfills them through Christ. Reassure children that the same "forever" love is for us today.

God's love is real, unshakable, and personal. Teach children to respond.



SCRIPTURE Matthew 16:13-19, "Who do you say that I AM?"

This passage marks the foundation of the Catholic Church established to endure for all time. Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" It's a question not about popularity or public opinion, but about truth. At its core, Catholicism is built on the truth of who Jesus is. And truth stands,

whether it's popular or not.

Prompted by the Holy Spirit, Simon answered on behalf of the others: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). In response, Jesus renamed him Peter, meaning "Rock," and entrusted him

with the keys to the kingdom. This

was more than symbolism; it was the transfer of real authority to teach, to forgive, and to welcome people into the Church.

What can a parent do? Trust that Iesus established the Church on Peter to be a visible, lasting guide. Through it, He preserves the truth passed

down to the Apostles. When our own faith is strained, Peter's bold witness reminds us: Jesus is who He says He is, and His Church stands on that unshakable truth.



June 2 - Saints Marcellinus and Peter (304). St. Marcellinus, a priest, and St. Peter an exorcist, were martyred under Emperor Diocletian. St. Peter freed the prison-keeper and his family from demonic influence by his prayers, and they were eventually baptized by St. Marcellinus.

June 9 - Mary, Mother of the Church (2018). On the Cross, Jesus gave us His mother to be our mother (John 19:27). Even in Heaven, she continues to support us by her prayers as our spiritual mother.

June 15 - The Most Holy

Trinity. Today, we honor the central mystery of our Faith - that there is one God in three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus revealed this mystery after the Resurrection (Matthew 28:19).

June 28 - St. Irenaeus of Lyons (c. 202). As bishop of Lyons, Irenaeus investigated and disproved assertions of the Gnostics, who claimed to have secret knowledge imparted by Jesus. In great service to the Church, Irenaeus clarified Church teaching and gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics.
